Note – I: In accordance with the decision taken by the EU General Affairs and External Relations Council on November, 11 2006, Cyprus (Additional Protocol) issue is an 'Opening Criterion' for 8 sessions marked as (*) and a 'Closing Criterion' for all the rest above-mentioned chapters.

Note – II: Chapters No.11, 17, 22, 33 and 35 are intervened by France on account of the fact that they are 'directly relevant to the membership'.



The accession negotiations are detailed investigation process in which how and within frame of which schedule the candidate countries will accept European Union acquis and how they will build the administrative structure that is required for the implementation are determined. The information regarding following were given in the comprehensive screening:

- Is the candidate country able to accept the acquis in the relevant session?
- Are the laws appropriate to the acquis in the relevant session accepted? If they are not, which schedule is anticipated?
- Are the administrative structures which are required to apply the acquis in the relevant session? If they are not, when will they be established?
- Is transition measure being required in the relevant session anticipated? (The preliminary information which is given regarding transition arrangements in the screening process are not to be binding. These requests will be substantially included in the position document.)

• Energy Chapter

The representatives of the Ministry of Energy and Natural Resources, the Ministry of Industry and Trade, the Ministry of Defence, the Ministry of Public Works and Settlement, the Ministry of Environment, the Ministry of Finance, the Ministry of Internal Affairs, the Undersecretariat of Treasure, the Undersecretariat of Foreign Trade, the Privatization Administration, the Energy Market Regulatory Authority, the Turkish Statistical Institute and the Competition Authority as well as 5 members of the Monitoring and Directing Committee (the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, the Secretariat General for EU Affairs, the State Planning Organization, the Prime Ministry and EU's Permanent Representative) have attended to the screening meetings.

Energy chapter was addressed within the scope of 'Transportation, Environment, Energy and Trans-European Networks Subcommittee' which was established in the 39th meeting of Turkey-Europe Communities Council of Association on April 11th, 2000, with the purpose of compatibility to the legislation. Meetings of 5 rounds were arranged since 2000. In addition, the Energy Safety Working Group was also assembled on May 14th, 2004.

Discussions regarding opening of the energy chapter have continued from 'Comprehensive Screening' period which was performed in 2006.

- Explanatory Screening (May 15 17, 2006): In the meeting, the regulations in the fields of the government supports to electric, gas, hydrocarbons, coal and coal industry by EU authorities, smart energy, renewable energy resources, international agreements, management of the demand (energy service directives, energy performance of buildings...) and nuclear energy were reported. - Detailed Screening (June 14th 16th 2006): In the meeting, the detailed information regarding the regulations and implementations in our country was given by Turkish delegation.
